Existing home sales in-creased significantly here in March over February, ac-cording to the Wichita Falls Association of Realtors. The data showed that 157 existing homes were sold during the month, a jump of

66 from 91 in Pebruary. Also, the Multiple Listing Service statistics revealed that the sales volume was up \$8.8 million over February. The sales volume hit the \$18.2 The sales volume hit the \$18.2 million mark. In February, the total was \$9.4 million. And the March sales volume was up \$4.9 million over March '09, which was \$13.3 million. Year-to-date, the total existing home sales volume sits at \$36.5 million, an increase of \$1.5 million over \$35 million in '09.

Petition derails center remodel

Despite some missing information on a petition filed in the Burkburnett City Clerk's office Monday, issuing certificates of obligation to remodel the Burkburnett Community Center and add some sewer service will not be considered by the Burkburnett City Council

The petition was submit-ted at 11 a.m. Monday and contained 578 signatures. According to the Texas Elec-tion Code, all signatures must be accompanied by ad-dresses and dates of birthor voter registration numbers.

City Clerk Trish Holley made attempts to validate the signatures and was able to do so on 501 names, which exceeded the 348 signatures needed to pass.

An earmark is the appropriation of government spending that does not go through committee review. Hundreds of such amendments are added to the federal budget every year by senators and House members.

Often, they are local projects that bring money to a representative's district.

The "Pig Book" said earmarks for 2010 totaled S16.5 billion, down 15.5 percent from 2009. The number of carmarks also declined, by 10 percent — from 10,160 to 9,129.
